- a. In Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, and Texas, a runoff primary is held if no candidate receives at least 50% of the vote in the initial primary election. In South Dakota, a runoff primary is held if no candidate receives at least 35% of the vote. In Louisiana, a candidate who receives 50% or more of the vote in the primary is elected to the office. If no candidate receives 50% of the vote in the primary, a runoff election is held. All Louisiana candidates, regardless of party affiliation, compete against each other in the primary election, and the two highest vote-getters compete in the runoff, even if they belong to the same political party.
- b. Political party endorsing conventions may be held between May 2 and 23; a candidate subsequently files for the primary within 14 days after the convention.
- c. The Delaware legislature is to consider changes to the election calendar when it convenes in January 2006.
- d. A law was enacted in 2005 that will eliminate Florida's runoff primary, effective January 1, 2006. The run-off would have been held on October 3.
